Keep In Touch

We have been looking forward to having access to Weduc since February of this year and after a number of frustrating months, we finally have access to our new communication portal. This will be taking over from all other sources of information associated with the school to ensure that the information that people receive is accurate and accessible. The only exception to this is the school website because it is statutory, to have this information freely available. There will however be links from Weduc to the website when appropriate. 'Tapestry' and 'Seesaw' will continue to be used, but from September they will only relate to the childrens' learning and will no longer be used to pass on information and messages.

32% of parents signed up to Weduc within the first few days and many others have since enrolled. These parents are now accessing information available via the internet and through the app on their phone or tablet. The office are currently working through some parental enrolment queries and we hope to be able to resolve these soon. To ensure that you get the communication and reminders, it will be important to get access to Weduc before we break up as other forms of contact are being phased out over the coming weeks.

Summer Fair and Uniform Recycling

Open Afternoon

Year 5 were lucky to be invited to the International Bomber Command Centre to take part in work linked to the RAF Centenary project. We worked with Ash Dickinson, a brilliant poet, who inspired our pupils to be creative with their use of words. The monument was used as inspiration for the writing, after which they visited the museum to find out more about what life would have been like for people during the war. The children showed great thoughtfulness and wrote some very poignant poems, which have since been used back at school supported by artist Ruth Pigott.



Y5 also visited The Priory LSST to take part in a Science day. During this day they had to help solve a murder using chemicals: testing urine, hair samples, finger prints and pen samples. They also had the chance to visit the planetarium to look at the effects of space on the human body; created their own rainbow experiments by testing acids and alkalis; observed the effects of liquid nitrogen and how to use it to make things explode; used their understanding of forces to create a safe car for an egg; examined a real skeleton; worked with Anglian Water to look at how to filter water; and used different equipment to measure their sporting strength. It was a very busy day but inspirational and full of learning.
